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THE AUNTIES

Born in the mid-1800s, if one remembers them at all, they were known in town as the Hadley Sisters: Lizzie, Lucy and Mary..

They were brought up in what the family always referred to as The Homelands. This is the same house that Sarah and Eliza Goodridge were raised in - a connection that I find fun to think about.

The oldest of my three maiden (politically correct name for single women) Aunts was named Lizzie. As you can see she was not the lovely, Lizzie creature in the movie of <u>Pride and Prejudice</u>.

Like her sisters, Lizzie Jeanette Hadley was a school teacher and although they left Templeton to attend Normal School, to travel, and for a short time to teach in other communities, their home was always here.

Mr. Apple Orchard Pease and my new friend Eloise Kenny still remember them. And when I was a very young child our family paid the requisite visit at least one Sunday afternoon a month. I wasn't exactly afraid of them, but corseted, with a ram rod spine and a reprimand "Don't fidget, child", Lizzie was a bit daunting.

Mr. Pease tells of Lizzie's driving – something that was indeed fearsome. She drove everywhere. She arrived in the upper orchard one afternoon when father and son were gathering apples. This cart road was passable for horses only, until Lizzie came jouncing and banging up the hill. He says that her command of the road was unnerving, as she pointed the nose of the car down the center line and everyone knew enough to "Look Out".

Eloise recounts one Halloween Trick or Treating night where in lieu of candy, children at the door of The Hadley Sisters were treated with a healthy, but most unwelcome cup of cider.

As a young girl and looking for a short cut to school, Joyce Provencher dared to ask whether she and her siblings could cut through the Hadley Sister's driveway. She was given permission but told that she was never to so much as look in the windows. "Did You?" I asked. "Oh My, No!. I would never have dared. What if Lizzie had been looking out at me?"

Lizzy graduated from Templeton High School in 1885, taught for many years and I remember being allowed to go through the shelves in the library at their house on Patriots Road. They instilled in me a love of books, there was always an old one gifted at Christmas. Lizzie left me her gold nib, pearl stem pen. I treasure it.

Member Profile

Susan McNeill Spuher

I have always loved history and genealogy. My mother's side of the family contains the Bartletts and Robert Bartlett first came from England to Plymouth in 1623. The Bartletts were one of the seven founding families of Lancaster, Massachusetts, which was settled in 1643 and incorporated in 1653. Josiah Bartlett (1729-1795) was one of signer of the Declaration of Independence.

I come from a well traveled family. My paternal Grandparents visited all 50 states by the early 70's and alway had photos and tales of great adventures. This helped ignite my Love of travel. A 1991 trip to Stonehenge in England was a turning point in my life where I accidentally was introduced to dowsing, the art of finding water well sites, missing items and missing people. This is a skill that I've honed over the past 23 years. I've been President of the Boston Dowsers since 2002 speaking at dozens of conferences and organizations including haunted churches not to mention dowsing hundreds of wells.

In 1993 my observation while performing demonstrations at the now defunct National Plastics Center and Museum was that students were not very interested in learning about math and science. The idea came to me to create my own kids TV science show. I named it Susan's Science Center and the show was on local Leominster cable every other week where I performed live kitchen chemistry experiments. My assistant was the Gravity Gorilla whom I dressed in a fluorescent green cumber bun, vest and bow tie. My motto was "if you're not careful, you may just learn something". The show ran for three years and I would have local guest celebrities and children on the show. I asked scientific questions where you had to call in with a correct answer and you could win edgy prizes like the newly invented Glide dental floss that was made of goretex or a Fisher Space pen that would write under water or upside down and never freeze. While a part Time ski instructor at Wachusett Mountain, I also wrote a weekly ski column for the Sentinel & Enterprise. This gained me free ski passes at resorts from Pat's Peak in Henniker, NH to Snowmass in Aspen, Colo-

rado. While working on my technical MBA at Worcester Polytechnic Institute in 1998, I started looking for a different job than my research position in non-inertial guidance systems at the Charles Stark Draper laboratory. A WPI classmate introduced me to Tom Spuhler who was supposed to help me get a job at Hewlett-Packard. Instead he took me skiing in Aspen, dragged me to Paris numerous times and on one of those trips proposed to me under the Eiffel Tower. We were married on April 23, 2001 and returned to Paris for our honeymoon. Over the years I've thrown many large parties that include circus tents and Elvis impersonators who are whisked onto our stage/deck via our neighbor's convertible. Besides playing Madame Volka, Santa Claus for the Jack Frost parade and scanning documents for the Narragansett historical society, I am a Corporator for Concord's Emerson Hospital. My interests include triathlons, golf, swimming across Walden Pond every day from mid -May to Mid-October and collecting eclectic art which includes a 12 foot tall, 20 foot long dinosaur made of metal tubing, a moose made of car parts and a church pew from the Baldwinville Baptist church. I was the first person in Middlesex county to install a Little Free Library in front of my house (www.littlefreelibrary.org). In Westford I have served on town committees which include the Registered Marijuana Dispensary Committee and currently the Master Plan Implementation Committee. Since our town moderator is retiring, I will run for that position during the next election. I live in Westford with my Californian husband who cooks for me and tolerates my eclectic nature with a rare patience. I also have three cats, a cockatiel and numerous Society Finches. It was always special to him and every year that I can remember, he would get my mother a gift and not even give her a clue that it was coming but it was always something that he knew she really wanted. There was one time that he had gotten her a gift and I couldn't wait to break the news so I did it a little early and he let me know in no uncertain words that I had ruined Christmas. I was told that Santa would not be very happy with me and I might not get anything this year for doing that so from then on I was on my best behavior.

They tried to keep me believing in Santa as long as they could. If I told them that one of my friends told me he wasn't real, they told me not to believe them. They did a really good job of convincing me to the extent that one Christmas morning I actually went out side and stood in the road looking up on the roof for tracks. There was one Christmas when I must have been showing them that I had some doubt because that Christmas eve, I had put out a cup of coffee and cookies for Santa and when I got up in the morning it was gone.
